Program Admission Requirements

- BSN from an ACEN or CCNE accredited program (*institution must be regionally accredited)
- Undergraduate GPA of 3.0
- Completed application and non-refundable fee
- Official transcripts from all previous U.S. colleges attended or official NACES course-by-course evaluation of any foreign transcripts*
- Submission of a 250-500-word essay discussing goals and objectives for pursuing admission to the intended program
- Current resume
- Copy of current, unencumbered NJ nursing license
- Two (2) letters of recommendation (required ONLY for M.S. degree)
