Though there is no urgency to remove those 18 now. 19 **Motion Passes** 20 21 22 **Motion to Approve Framework on Prior Learning Credits Process** 23 24 02eASC Policy for PLC.pdf 25 26 Discussion 27 Prior Learning Credits is an all-encompassing term. Are fees appropriate if they are already 28 paying a fee for an exam. Ramapo charges \$168, perhaps NJCU can charge \$100, that is the fee 29 for dual enrollment. There were some questions regarding the credits for Fire Science. These 30 questions can be worked out with the committee. This is a 'framework' for a policy, not a 31 32 policy. Note: "Step 3. Administration to form a committee including department chairs, staff, and administration to work on a comprehensive portfolio assessment component of the PLC 33 policy. For finalization by August 31, 2024, for implementation in the Fall of 2024." There are 34 questions about courses that do not fit into a specific disciple or department. In terms of transfer 35 credits, 90 is the maximum. If you have that, you will not be allowed to have additional PLC 36 classes. Consider allowing 3<sup>rd</sup> party testing for a fee and a fee sharing structure for prior learning. 37 Another school accepts 30 credits for a nursing license, and if we followed this model we would 38 39 be more attractive to students. We also need to consider certificates from non-industry-standard trainers and sources. It was noted that students have time responsibilities outside of classes; that it is difficult for 46

students to find spaces to access synchronous online courses during the day; that the question of quality of modalities is not supported by research one way or another; that there was not transparency or consultation in these decisions; that we need a vibrant campus presence; that though the university has the legal right to set the modality, the academic merits is a Senate concern; that shared governance has to be more than asking faculty to do committee work and include input on important decisions. Both pros and cons to the issue put the student experience and retention at the center of their points.
