<p>Program Goals</p>	<p>The PsyD program will serve as a doctoral extension of the current MA in Educational Psychology/Professional Diploma (PD) in school Psychology program. The current program is 74 credits leading to certification as a school psychologist at the professional diploma level, also known as a specialist-level program. The existing program intends to provide post-Master’s level training with an urban school psychology focus, i.e., explore, and problem-solve with its participants, the challenges faced by underserved communities. The new program plans to extend the existing PD program to doctoral-level education in two ways: 1. To serve as an opportunity for currently certified school psychologists to return for doctoral level education in order to bring to bear research methods, statistical analysis, and intensive study to challenges related to social justice, cultural competence, systemic program evaluation, and supporting underserved communities; and 2. To establish a five-year doctoral sequence for selected participants entering the existing program for the purposes described.</p>
