This fall has been a remarkable season of collaboration and innovation, and I would like to reflect on some of the things I am thankful for:

- In October, I had the honor of joining President Acebo and Provost Breault at the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) Conference, where we presented the strides NJCU has made since 2022. The presentation highlighted NJCU's collective accomplishments, and I'm proud to share that it was met with enthusiasm and requests from attendees to visit NJCU to see our work firsthand.
- Advancing College Readiness Nationally: I was humbled to be selected to serve on the American Association of Community College's Commission for College Readiness.  an enhanced OSAS advising tool built in-house, incorporating feedback from students, faculty, and staff. With
 over 100 enhancement requests, this tool reflects the institution's commitment to empowering advisors and
 supporting students. I am excited about the upcoming training sessions that will help our community maximize its
 potential.

As I reflect on these milestones, I am deeply thankful for each and every member of the NJCU community who participates in student success and retention. Whether through teaching, advising, mentoring, campus maintenance, or administrative work, your dedication fuels our mission and ensures that our students continue to achieve success.

GEAR UP/COLLEGE BOUND



The GEAR UP team, in collaboration with NJCU's Assistant Director for Educational Partnerships, hosted a workshop for over 20 Dual Enrollment students, highlighting academic support services. This fall, GEAR UP also held five Saturday sessions, each averaging over 150 students, provided academic support in Math, Science, and ELA, along with mental health workshops led by college mentors.

In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, GEAR UP scholars volunteered and participated in LATI events, including the "Stories of Belonging" program and the closing ceremony. On October 19th, scholars joined peers from across New Jersey for a Mentor Protégé Retreat hosted by OSHE, fostering connections and mentorship opportunities.

On October 26th, students attended NJCU's open house, participating in campus tours, admissions sessions, and a college fair. This fall, GEAR UP scholars explored several universities as part of their exploration of higher educational options. Visits included trips to Saint Peter's University on November 1st and NJIT on November 8th.







UNIVERSITY ADVISEMENT CENTER

Advisors have been assisting students with schedule planning, guiding seniors through their final steps toward graduation, and supporting transfer and first-year students as they begin their journeys as Gothic Knights.

To further support students, the UAC has strengthened its collaboration with the Admissions team to enhance First-Year Initiatives, ensuring a seamless transition for new students into university life.

During the week of November 18th, UAC advisors tabled across campus, providing on-the-spot registration assistance, answering questions, and helping students navigate their academic paths. Students were encouraged to take advantage of this convenient opportunity to connect with advisors and receive personalized guidance.







MEN OF COLOR INITIATIVE

The Men of Color Initiative (MOCI) at NJCU had a remarkable November, marked by events fostering community and student development. A standout was the MOCI Barbershop Event, held in collaboration with Housing, which transformed a student space into a barbershop pop-up. Over 75 students attended, receiving free haircuts while engaging in meaningful conversations that strengthened community ties.

Other highlights included the launch of the Focus Lab, a mobile quiet study space supporting focused learning, and the Annual Sneaker Challenge, which continues to boost program visibility and excitement. Grammynominated artist Krvm inspired students during an impromptu visit.

The month also featured a Self-Defense Workshop, co-hosted by MOCI, fostering empowerment and practical skill-building, and a film screening of "Rob Peace", sparking thought-provoking discussions.

Additionally, MOCI member Jalen Gallaway represented the program performing the National Anthem at the NJCU men's basketball game against Stevens.

Paradigm Shift facilitated a Social-Emotional Learning workshop for TRIO students on November 6th, guiding them in self-expression and the development of healthy boundaries. On November 8th, Paradigm Shift returned to provide professional development for TRIO staff, focusing on empowering students with essential 21st-century skills such as communication and responsibility.

YOUTH CORPS


